Rector's Letter:

The Armistice of Compiègne, from the place where it was signed, came into force at 11 a.m. Paris time on 11 November 1918 ("the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month") and marked a victory for the Allies and

a complete defeat for Germany. The actual signing had taken place earlier in the day, but 11am was the time when the agreement became a reality.

A turning point in history which resulted in much joy and celebration,

the Great War was over; peace had been established. I often wonder how and when the news first broke in Portadown on that Monday morning in November. There were no instant text messages or tweets back then!

10.30am Centenary Remembrance Service, during which we will hold two minutes' silence at 11.00am to coincide with the time the Armistice became effective.

This was the scene on 11th November at Buckingham Palace, and I am sure there were similar scenes of celebration throughout the country-peace at last! Celebrations were followed by services of Thanksgiving in many Churches and special orders of service were produced for those. Of course in the midst of the celebration and thanksgiving was the suffering and loss that many experienced as a result of the War. An evil of war had been overcome, but at a great cost.

As we reflect on the last 100 years we continue to give thanks for the sacrifice that led to the cessation of violence, but we also realise that the 'War to end all Wars' has unfortunately not achieved that result. Further, as we look around us in the present and into the future it is important that we seek to do all we can to encourage all mankind to live in harmony with one another as we learn from the past.

Alongside the town events organised by the Royal British Legion, to mark the Centenary we in Seagoe will be marking this significant point in history. We are organising the following events:

Major Parish Building and Restoration Projects Seagoe's church tower to be restored

Over the next few months the church tower will be undergoing essential major restoration work with replacement of stone mortar, windows and leadwork and the sandstone repaired. A new lightning conductor will be installed and the church bell will be repaired enabling it to be rung again. The cost for this work is over £170,000 however through grant assistance from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Listed Places of Worship Scheme this should be reduced to £60,000.



Seagoe Magazine Digitisation

Over the next few months it is planned to digitise all of Seagoe's Parish Magazines from 1905 to 1935. About 1500 pages will be able to be viewed on the internet. It is also planned to have a virtual tour of the church tower when it is restored. The cost of this work is over £10,000 however through grant assistance from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Listed Places of Worship Scheme this should be reduced to less than £5,000.

St. Patrick's and Killicomaine Youth Centre to be rebuilt

In the last edition of the Magazine it was mentioned that Seagoe Youth Group had just been awarded a major proportion of a £6million Department of Education Grant towards capital works at a variety of venues. Subsequently it has transpired that the funders consider it more advantageous to rebuild the entire complex rather than to repair and upgrade the existing buildings. The Management Committee of the Youth Groups is currently working along with the Education Authority's architects in devising plans for what should be an excellent facility to suit present and future youth work in the area.

A variety of suggested plans is now available to be viewed at both the Youth Centre and Seagoe Parish Centre. User groups and other interested parties are asked to comment on the proposals and to suggest any alterations.



The period of consultation needs to end soon so that final plans can be drawn up ASAP. The final plans will then be submitted to the Representative Church Body in Dublin, which holds the land and buildings on behalf of the Parish, for approval.

It is hoped that work will commence early next year and take about a year to complete.

closer as a team but perhaps the unplanned ones really fortified our friendships visit the long drop (toilet) before the 2 hour 'African massage' journey home anyone?



Church Lads' & Church Girls' Brigade 125th Anniversary

In 1883 William Smith started the Boy's Brigade, an inter-denominational organisation for boys. Soon after, on 23rd July 1891 Rev. Walter Gee established the first company of the CLB in St. Andrew's Church, Fulham. This new Anglican based organisation linked the company to the local Parish. In 1893 the first CLB Company in Ireland was established in Christchurch, Leeson Park, Dublin.

In 1901 The Church Red Cross Brigade for girls was established, the name was changed in 1911 to The Church Nursing and Ambulance Brigade, in 1922 changed again to The Church Girls' Brigade as there was a desire to amalgamate with the CLB. Unfortunately this did not happen until 1978.



CL&CGB in Seagoe

It is amazing to think that the Seagoe Company of the CLB was founded in 1902 and the CGB in 1945 and is currently the oldest surviving Girls' Company. Over the years the Brigade has sought to forward its aim-"The extension of God's kingdom amongst the boys and girls of our parishes." Certainly in Seagoe many will be able to testify to the benefits membership has brought them. In celebrating the anniversary the Ulster Regiment has organised a Thanksgiving Celebration to be held in Armagh Cathedral on Sunday 30th September at 3.30pm. In Seagoe we will be celebrating the 125th anniversary as part of the Brigade Enrollment Service to be held on Sunday 21st October at 10.00am. The service will be of particular significance in that it will be broadcast live on Radio Ulster!!! In order to facilitate the broadcast everyone will have to be seated by 10.00am at the latest for the commencement of the broadcast at 10.15am. We encourage as many people as possible to attend this very significant service.
