n many ways this is the theme of most of our Church life. Advent is normally seen as a period of preparation for Christmas, with all the busyness and hype that that brings in our generation! Presents are bought and got ready for distribution, cards are written and got ready to post, parties are organised and food is bought as if it is going out of fashion! Somewhere in the midst of all that there may be some thought about what Church people often refer to as 'the real meaning of Christmas': Jesus. From a Church point of view it is also a season of preparation during which we look back with gratitude for the gift of Jesus, but also look forward to his coming again at the end of time to reign over all. For many there are tensions of trying to hold together all the trappings of Christmas with the simplicity of the Biblical message.

Looking back

As we look back I think it is fair to say that Christmases past were much simpler events for many. Money was not as plentiful to begin with, and so many of the things we take for granted nowadays were beyond the reach of the ordinary person. Of course we often romanticise the past, but I wonder if the more simple Christmas celebrations might have allowed people to focus more on the message of Christmas and perhaps to make more of the opportunities to gather for worship.

Within this edition of the magazine we have copied for you some of the Parish magazine of 1918. It makes for very interesting reading in that it details the ending of the First World War. I would imagine that Christmas 1918 was a great celebration of family thanksgiving for many, yet for so many others great sadness of Christmas with the loss of loved

Looking forward

As we look forward we face what could well be our last Christmas as part of the European Union. Just as the 'true meaning of Christmas'

means very little to a lot of people, so does the thought of having Christmas outside of the EU! It may be hard to determine what differences there were in celebrating Christmas and life in general as we look back in time, but perhaps more so it is impossible to predict what the future has in store either as our result of leaving EU, or dare I say it, if another referendum determines that we should remain! Inevitably a lot of life will remain the same, but there may well be major changes ahead that noone has any idea of currently.

A point in the middle

I think therefore that both looking back and looking forward remind us that we live life a day at a time. Into that comes the wonderful message not only of Christmas, but the Word of God in all its fullness, that the world is God's and He directs it and us. In the midst of change and uncertainly it is reassuring that, as Christmas reminds us, God in His love and mercy entered the world in the person of His Son to make real to us his loving presence and saving grace. Emmanuel, God is with us. In the midst of life I do not think we are released from learning from the past or planning for the future, but we do so with gratitude and dependence upon the God of the universe who has plans to bless us. It is when we 'go it alone', or think only of ourselves, that we lose out on the best that He has for us. God longs for us, in whatever situation we find ourselves, to open ourselves to His loving presence and guidance so that he can enable us to live life in all its fullness. Let us therefore, this Christmas, truly focus on the greatest gift of all time, Jesus, Emmanuel.

Emmanuel, God is with us enriching our lives, but as He does so He longs to reach out through us to those around us. He entered a broken world to bring hope and meaning, and when we have Him

with us He longs to use us to bring that hope to others. Recently I was struck by the story of the feeding of the five thousand. Such an amazing miracle of grace in God providing for the needs of everyone present, and yet with such abundance left over: God's blessing can more than satisfy everyone's need. What struck me was that Jesus could have provided for everyone, just as he created the world from nothing, yet he waited for one young boy to bring his simple lunch as an offering. We may not consider that we have much to offer, but when it is offered into the hands of God only He knows what he can do with it. I can just imagine the young boy as Jesus multiplied his offer -God-smacked!!

As we look around this Christmas there are many opportunities to offer God our lives to be Emmanuel to others. Perhaps making time for someone others forget, encouraging someone not to give us a present when we know they cannot really afford it, putting a few items together with others to provide a hamper for a family, introducing someone to CAP so that they can see a way forward in debt, offering to help at a Church event, giving money to the benefit of others, buying a hot drink and a snack for someone sleeping rough-and perhaps even talking to them as we do so, inviting and bringing someone to one of the many Christmas events or services, inviting someone to Christmas lunch, and so the list goes on. The birth of Jesus may have seemed so insignificant to many, as may our simple offering, but God can take the simple small action and make much of it.

This Christmas don't just take, give; and see what God can do.

We were glad to organise several International evenings and the 'Taste of India' for the Leprosy Mission with our friends from Africa, Romania, Poland, India and Iran, these were times of fun and also exposure to other cultures. We really appreciated the support and help of the members in organising these events. We also had times of great sadness when some of our beloved members went to be with the Lord however we have the confidence that we will meet them one day in the presence of the Lord. It was very difficult to say goodbye at the end of our time in Seagoe, the last Sunday especially the farewell in the hall was very hard for us. Premila and I would like to say 'Thank you' very sincerely to Terence and the Seagoe family for your love and your very kind and generous farewell gift.

Some of you were praying for our future ministry and in answer to those prayers Bishop Harold asked if I would be interested in looking after two churches in Kilwarlin as a part-time minister for a period of two years. 

On Sunday 18th November I was pleased to welcome Jill Donaldson, Vivian McCormick and Roberta Milligan to Seagoe Branch of Mothers' Union. Seagoe Mothers' Union is only one of the Branches of Down & Dromore Diocese, but the Mothers' Union is a Worldwide Organization in 83 Countries and 4 Million Strong, putting their Faith into Action to nurture healthy relationships in families and communities and to fight for social justice.

Some of the work which is carried out in MU was shown on a short DVD in Church and covers the following:-

Donation of Soap Bags – These are Toiletry bags for our local Hospitals for those patients who have nothing when they have to go into hospital.

Knitted Items – Knitted baby clothes, hats and blankets, fiddle blankets and twiddle muffs are donated to local hospitals, and Women's Aid Shelters in Newry and Bangor.

We also help support 16 Days Stand against Gender-Based Violence. This is a campaign for an end to gender based violence against Women, Men, Children as well as those suffering Mental, Psychological and Emotional abuse.

All of these are worthwhile causes and are always need support.

Mission to Seafarers

The Mission to Seafarers is one of the missions that we support.

The world's merchant fleet has over 42,000 ships. Over 90% of goods used on a daily basis are transported by sea. There are over 1.3 million seafarers currently at work manning cargo ships, oil tankers, tugs, ferries and cruise ships.



Chaplains visit seafarers and provide a service of care and support. They also offer support to the families of seafarers, especially in times of crisis.

Mission centres welcome seafarers. Here they can avail of telephone, Internet and recreational activities, and enjoy their time away from the ship. It is recognised that the seafarers have spiritual needs and - if requested - the Chaplains offer appropriate support.

The Mission works nationally and internationally to achieve justice for seafarers. It also campaigns for seafarers' rights.

Once again the ladies in Seagoe have been using one of their talents by knitting warm, woolly hats. Other people generously donate socks, gloves, scarves and toiletries. These are delivered to the Flying Angel centre in Belfast where they are wrapped as Christmas gifts. They are very gratefully received and bring comfort and encouragement to visiting seafarers who are far from home and loved ones.




Alpha Course in Killicomaine Jubilee Community Centre

ur Alpha Course in the Community Centre started on the evening of Tuesday 25 September. We had 14 'guests' on that first night and 6 'helpers'. Since then numbers have been remarkably steady and I have been blessed to see friendships develop between the guests and an all round sense of 'community' form between us all.

We have looked at topics like 'Who is Jesus', 'Why did Jesus die?', 'How can I have faith?', 'How and why should I read the Bible', 'How and why should I pray?' and 'How do I resist evil?' It has been immensely encouraging to see many on the course come on leaps and bounds in their faith!

We had our course 'Away Day' on Saturday 10 November in Kilkeel when we closely



looked at the topic of the Holy Spirit. We had talks from New Wine's George Newell on 'Who is the Holy Spirit?' and 'What does the Holy Spirit do?' Then from Willowfield Church's Glynis Matchett on 'How can I be filled with the Holy Spirit?' A time of prayer followed the



final session with some healed physically, emotionally and spiritually.

The feeling of bonding between those on the course has come out in conversations with many asking; "what happens when the course is finished?" off the back of those conversations we have chatted, prayed and are led to start a new Discipleship Group for those on the course and others who would like to join. We will be looking at the resource 'The Jesus Lifestyle' by Nicky Gumbel where he goes piece by piece through the 'Sermon the Mount' to discover exactly what it means to become a Disciple of Jesus.

Seagoe's church tower is being restored

Until the end of February 2019, the church tower will be undergoing essential major restoration work with replacement of stone mortar, windows and leadwork and the sandstone repaired.

A new lightening conductor will be installed and the church bell will be repaired enabling it to be

the church bell will be repaired enabling it to be rung again. The main contractors are R J McKelvey Ltd.

The restoration of the tower is the second phase of the church restoration project (the replacement of the church roof was the first phase completed in 2014).

Future phases are the restoration of the external nave and transept stonework and internal restoration including re-organising, re-wiring, relighting and re-heating.

Until the end of February 2019, the church tower will be undergoing essential major restoration work consisting of raking out of all existing mortar joints and replacing with lime mortar, repair of louvre blades, the application of leadwork to the ledges and the four tower pinnacles, replacing the drainpipes with matching new black ones, sandstone repairs in various places where it has become damaged, the entrance and internal doors sanded and re-stained, removal of floor tiles and replacement with matching new ones, new ground floor screed flooring, re-plastering of walls, and ceilings, the provision of new floors to all three levels, more secure ladders, new hatches and a new gravel trench with land drain. Allowances have been made for finding wet and dry rot, asbestos removal, re-carving of the Diocesan crest and repairing windows, A new lightening conductor will be installed and the church bell will be repaired enabling it to be rung again.

The architects are Knox & Markwell who

designed the Parish Centre and supervised the replacement of the church roof in 2014. They are being assisted by RG Structures, structural engineers and Bailie Associates, electrical consultants. The main contractors are R J McKelvey Ltd. who were selected as



having relevant experience and were the lowest tender price (£137,890.65 excluding VAT). This cost may be more if unforeseen problems occur or less if contingencies are not required. In addition to the contractors cost, the outstanding professional fees will be £5,225.

Heritage Lottery Fund are supporting this project and suggested we should have a parallel project which would engage with the local community. This project is the digitisation of the parish magazines which together with a virtual reality tour and publicity will cost £10,035.

Together with additional expected maintenance over the next 5 years and allowable inflation costs we will receive a grant of up to £98,500. In addition, VAT of up to £32,646 is expected to be reclaimed from the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme leaving the current expected cost to the parish as projected to be £62,730. This is being paid for out of the Church Restoration Fund which parishioners have donated to over the last few years. At the end of 2017 this fund stood at £85,390 hence we are able to fully fund the restoration of the tower, however the fund is at present unable to pay for the next phase of the church restoration.


