History


istory was never my favourite subject at school, in fact I was delighted to be able to give it up at the end of third year! Tudor and Stewart Kings of England never really caught my imagination. I think it regrettable that we did not learn any Irish history as it might have been more engaging! With age I now value history much more and regret that I am ignorant of so much that is important.

This June holds a number of important historical events and anniversaries, not the least the 75th anniversary or D-day, and coming closer to home the launch of Seagoe Archives, and personally the 30th anniversary of my ordination.

D-day

This is perhaps one of the most significant events in history that has led to Europe and the wider world living in freedom. The largest seaborne invasion in history took place along the Normandy coast on the morning of 6th June 1944. The tragedy is that thousands of troops and civilians lost their lives and countless others suffered wounds to mind and body which affected them throughout their lives. But the cost led to the pushing back of the Nazi held territory, and eventually to the emancipation of Europe, for which we are so thankful.

In Seagoe we were privileged to host the Royal British Legion organised concert of commemoration on 31st May. In addition to some historical input on D-day, the band of the Royal Regiment of Fusilliers (Lancashire) presented a very varied programme. An act of commemoration was incorporated into our morning



service on Sunday 9th June.

Seagoe Archives

Tuesday 4th June saw the launch of our Seagoe Archives website (see page 5).

We are indebted to Philip Holland who has worked on our behalf to coordinate making some of our archives available in this way.

His story

As I mentioned, as a young person I had no interest in history, but now I value its relevance. Following the unfolding course of history teaches us so much and equips us for living in the present and future. I believe as Christians that we can learn much more from history as it truly is His story; that God is ultimately the one who is most intimately involved in the unfolding of history. The Old Testament records very clearly our ancestors in faith viewing history

as God's unfolding plan working through events, some of which might have appeared not overly significant at the time to human understanding.

When we understand history in this way we can see just how vital it is both to look back carefully to trace God's hand, but also to seek what he is doing in the present, and to realise that we are living parts of his story. The history of our Parish demonstrates this very well for us. Through the various documents we have we can read of God at work in this place through the years and in particular through individuals. Many names and events are unknown to us, but as we read back we read of people living to God's glory and being part of His story that has led to the Church we love and are privileged to be part of.

No matter what is going on in

life around us, there is so much in Scripture to encourage us that the God who has created all things and has worked through people in every age is still and always will be with us, working out His story in and through us. How exciting to realise that God has an interest in each one of us and longs to use us as vital parts of His story of salvation and blessing passing down the generations. Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". Rom 8.39 'Nothing in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Iesus our Lord.'

May the Lord bless you as he guides you through His story.

Church Tower

We are delighted that the restoration work on the tower is now completed, except for a few stonework repairs. Response from parishioners has been extremely positive; in particular people are delighted that the Church bell is



functioning again. The bell now operates via an electronic programmer that in turn causes a hammer to strike the bell. The bell has been programmed to ring for 15 minutes before each service. There is also the facility to ring it for weddings,

funerals, and on other occasions. Thank you again in particular to Philip Holland for his diligent work in overseeing the project and for the grant process that has contributed so significantly to the costs involved.

Church pillars and gates

As we go to press the Church pillars are in the process of being rebuilt following damage last summer. McConnells of Kilkeel have sensitively repaired some of the original stone and incorporated new stone where necessary. The undamaged pillar will be cleaned to match the restored pillar. The gates will shortly be back in place following their restoration and repainting.



Update on St. Patrick's

Last year it was announced that Seagoe Youth Group had won a share of The Department for Education's £5.9m investment for capital developments.

Initially we had hoped that work to rebuild the complex would have commenced this month, however there has been an unfortunate delay due to the workload of the Department. As a result we are now anticipating work should commence next year.

Some members of Seagoe Youth Group's Management Committee have been meeting with the Education Authority's appointed architect to discuss the plans for the new building. To help in this process some visits to other new builds have taken place and a consultation with user groups at Killicomaine have taken place.. We will keep our readers updated as further developments in the process take place.

Church interior

The Vestry has engaged Knox Markwell Architects to advise on possibilities for the upgrading of the heating system in the Church. The upgrade will probably have a number of knock on aspects of renovation and so the Vestry has made a few visits to churches that have recently undergone similar internal renovations. While awaiting the report Vestry members will continue to visit other churches where work has been done to help it in its consideration.

Rectory Windows

Having been in place for over 30yrs many of the windows at the Rectory had started to fail and so the Vestry have decided to have them replaced. It is hoped that the triple glazed windows will help the energy efficiency of the rectory.



Each year hundreds of properties including Seagoe Parish open their doors and many organisations put on events for FREE across Northern Ireland as part of European Heritage Open Days (EHOD). EHOD takes place every year on the second weekend of September. This year that is the 14 and 15 September which presents an opportunity to explore the tangible and intangible elements of heritage and learn about our history and architecture.

The Church will be open on Saturday from 11am-4pm and on Sunday from 2pm-5pm. Refreshments will be available

This year we will have a guided tour of the church and an opportunity to explore the rich archives which Seagoe possesses both physically, from the births marriages and deaths from 1670 and on the website seagoearchives.uk



The site has been accessed from UK (4,790 page views), Republic of Ireland, France, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland, Germany, Norway, Canada, USA, South Africa, India, Pakistan, Vietnam, Australia and New Zealand!!

Diocesan Reader Commissioning

ack in the autumn of 2016 Heather Boyd and Trevor Forde applied to do the Diocesan Lay Readers course. The course is a post graduate certificate in Christian Ministry which is designed to equip new readers with the skills, knowledge and confidence to exegete and explain any passage of the bible in such a way as to help others make progress in the Christian faith by applying the teachings of Christ to their lives. Consisting of three main study modules that were submitted to St John's Nottingham and Durham University for assessment, modules included Biblical studies, Christian Doctrine, Theological Perspectives, Church History (Ireland), Introduction to Hermeneutics (Preaching) and Introduction to Liturgy.

The course demands a huge commitment but as Trevor has stated, 'Please don't misunderstand me, whilst it did require commitment it was worth every moment as I loved every part of the course, friendships and fellowship with the others on the course and also the tutors when we met for collective study days in Belfast and Dublin.'

Heather states, 'I would say that the last 2 years have been the hardest two years of my life especially when juggling family life and a



job. The studying was intensive and the reading material at times was very difficult. Sometimes I was working to crazy hours of the night!'


Killicomaine Mens' Club

e were delighted on Sunday 12th May to welcome back to Seagoe one of our ormer parishioners, Rev. Barry Forde following a 150 miles sponsored cycle ide, the length of Ireland, that he and others from the chaplaincy at Queens

University had just completed. They cycled to raise funds for two charities that the chaplaincy supports and to which a team of 22 students will visit for the last two seeks in June.

Barry commented: 'It was very numbling for me to return to the parish that I grew up in and to see you respond the way that you did. To everyone who made traybakes, scones, poured tea, served coffee, and donated funds hank you! It is hugely appreciated. Your efforts are now added to the dozens of thers who together have contributed



over £17,500 to our mission partners in Uganda'. (Seagoe parishioners contributed approx £1,000)

On that date I chose to speak from the letter of Paul to Philippians. In that letter Paul also writes

"I thank my God every time I remember you.
